

ORDINANCE NO. 436

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KIRKLAND, WASHINGTON, DECLARING THAT THERE EXISTS A PUBLIC EMERGENCY OTHER THAN ONE OF THOSE ENUMERATED IN REMINGTON'S REVISED STATUTES, SECTION 9000-6, WHICH SAID EMERGENCY COULD NOT REASONABLY HAVE BEEN FORESEEN AT THE TIME OF MAKING THE BUDGET FOR THE YEAR 1940 AND APPROPRIATING THE SUM OF \$7,000.00 TOWARDS THE CONSTRUCTION OF A 100,000 GALLON WOODEN WATER TANK ON CITY OWNED PROPERTY FOR WATER STORAGE PURPOSES.

The City Council of the City of Kirkland do ordain as follows:

Section I. The water storage tank owned by the City of Kirkland at its source of water supply in Section 5, Township 25, Range 5, is in a bad state of repair and in danger of collapse and there is serious danger that unless the same be at once replaced, the City of Kirkland may at any time be without a water supply and subject to a serious fire hazard.

Section II. That such a state of facts could not reasonably have been foreseen when the City's Budget for 1940 was adopted.

Section III. That because thereof, an emergency exists and to meet such emergency and to replace such tank, it is estimated it will require the expenditure of \$7000.00.

Section IV. That an emergency expenditure in an amount not to exceed \$7000.00 be authorized for the replacement of the said tank and that emergency warrants be issued upon the water fund, in not to exceed the said amount of \$7000.00.

Section V. This ordinance shall not be passed until one week after its introduction and shall require the unanimous vote of the Councilmen present and the approval of the Mayor.
