ORDINANCE NO. 585 and care

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KIRKLAND PROVIDING FOR A CALL FOR BIDS BEFORE AWARDING ANY CONTRACT FOR REPAIR OF ANY CITY EQUIPMENT WHERE THE AMOUNT INVOLVED EXCEEDS \$100.00.

WHEREAS, it appears that there may be substantial savings to the City of Kirkland by following the practice of calling for competitive bids for the repair of city owned equipment where the amount involved exceeds \$100.00, now, therefore,

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KIRKLAND DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Whenever it is deemed necessary or expedient to have any repairs, renovating, overhauling, additions to, or other work done in connection with any equipment owned or operated by the City of Kirk-land and the amount involved in such repair or addition shall exceed the sum of \$100.00, then the City Official, Department head or employee having the responsibility for such repair or improvement, shall call for bids in connection with such proposed repair or improvement and shall not award the contract for said work unless at least two bids have been secured.

Section 2. In any case where bids have been called for as required by this Ordinance, the Contract shall be awarded to the lowest bidder unless the City Council of the City of Kirkland shall otherwise direct.

Section 3. This Ordinance is intended to supplement existing Ordinances and Laws and is not intended to change procedures where contracts are presently being awarded under competitive bidding. That with this exception, all Ordinances and parts of Ordinances inconsistent herewith be and they hereby are repealed.

This Ordinance shall take effect from and after five days after the date of its publication.
