RESOLUTION R-5324

A RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF KIRKLAND AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 2018 OF A PROPOSITION AUTHORIZING AN INCREASE TO THE SALES AND USE TAX IN KIRKLAND OF ONE-TENTH OF ONE PERCENT (0.1%) ON THE SELLING PRICE TO FUND ENHANCED POLICE SERVICES AND COMMUNITY SAFETY; SETTING FORTH THE TEXT OF THE BALLOT PROPOSITION; DIRECTING PROPER CITY OFFICIALS TO TAKE NECESSARY ACTIONS; AND PROVIDING FOR OTHER PROPERLY RELATED MATTERS.

WHEREAS, the City Council ("Council") of the City of Kirkland, Washington ("City") has declared Kirkland a Safe, Inclusive and Welcoming City; and

5 WHEREAS, the Council's goal of keeping Kirkland Safe, Inclusive and Welcoming is challenged as Kirkland experiences unprecedented 6 7 economic growth and redevelopment, with over 4,500 residential units and over two million square feet of commercial and institutional 8 9 development currently under construction or at some phase in the 10 permitting system, bringing new jobs, shops, restaurants, services and housing options, as well as more people, businesses and traffic, and 11 new types of commercial and residential structures that need police and 12 13 fire services; and

WHEREAS, providing public safety services that match this economic growth and redevelopment is further challenged by the expiration of the annexation sales tax credit in 2021, resulting in the loss of nearly four million dollars annually from the City's general fund; and

WHEREAS, to help keep the community safe the Council, over the past five years, completed both a Police Strategic Plan and a Fire Strategic Plan to identify needed investments in staffing, equipment and technology to provide for more proactive community policing and better response times for fire and emergency medical services, as well as needed renovation and expansion of existing fire stations and the construction of a new, relocated Fire Station 27 east of I-405; and

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WHEREAS, while the 2017-2018 City Work Program originally called for the exploration of potential property tax measures for fire station modernization and public safety operations, the Council deferred this item in December of 2017 to at least 2020 due to resident concerns about current property tax levels due to state and regional actions; and

35 WHEREAS, as the Council considers how to meet these 36 challenges during the 2019-2020 Biennial Budget process, staff is using the adopted public safety strategic plans to guide the next roundof public safety investments; and

WHEREAS, the Police Strategic Plan's top priorities are additional patrol officers as well as the full funding and activation of a ProAct Unit focused on illegal drugs, car prowls, burglaries, mail theft, shoplifting, and other property crimes, as well as enforcing extreme risk protection orders and court-ordered gun forfeitures; and

WHEREAS, The ProAct Unit requires five (5) positions, including four (4) ProAct Police Officers and a support staff position with an approximate cost of \$680,000 per year in ongoing expenditures, in addition to one-time investments for vehicles and equipment; and

51 WHEREAS, a top staffing priority of the Fire Strategic Plan is to 52 add five (5) additional Firefighter/EMTs to fully staff new Station 24 in 53 Juanita when it is completed in 2020, at an additional cost of 54 approximately \$590,000 per year in ongoing expenditures; and 55

WHEREAS, on February 14, 2018, a mass shooting occurred at
Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, resulting in
seventeen students and staff killed and seventeen others wounded,
reigniting conversations across the nation about actions that could be
taken to reduce gun violence in the country and sparking strong activism
from students and parents of school age children; and

WHEREAS, local groups including Kirkland Indivisible, Kirkland
Safe, Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense in America, LWPTSA Council,
Alliance for Gun Responsibility, the Forward Together Network, the
Iman Center, Lake Washington Christian Church, Kirkland Interfaith
Network, and the Lutheran Peace Fellowship, have asked to the Council
to identify actions that Kirkland can take to reduce gun violence in
Kirkland and Washington State; and

71 WHEREAS, on March 14, 2018, the City Council welcomed over 72 70 parents from various Kirkland schools to City Hall to discuss actions that could be taken to keep students safe from gun violence, and on 73 74 March 21, 2018 the Lake Washington School District and the City hosted 75 a community discussion about school safety and community action at Lake Washington High School Theater and both events included 76 requests of the Council to work through Kirkland's state legislative 77 78 delegation to move legislation related to firearms safety and firearms 79 regulation; and

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81 WHEREAS, also in response to the Parkland and other school 82 shootings, the Lake Washington School District has proposed to share 83 the cost of adding four (4) new full-time school resource officers, one 84 officer each in the Finn Hill Middle School, Kamiakin Middle School,

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Kirkland Middle School and the International Community School, all in
 Kirkland; and

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88 WHEREAS, the City partners with the LWSD to help ensure that 89 the SRO program follows national best practices so that the SROs 90 protect, serve and improve the well-being of all of Kirkland's K-12 public school student population, regardless of race, gender, sexual 91 92 orientation, religion, resident and immigration status, age or ability, 93 including enhanced training for SROs about operating in a school 94 environment, such as crisis intervention training and appropriate 95 interactions with students experiencing emotional and mental health 96 challenges, setting clear roles for SROs, focusing on the SRO roles as 97 counselor, educator and relationship builder, helping ensure that the 98 school administration maintains authority over school safety and 99 maintaining quality SRO accountability and assessment metrics; and 100

WHEREAS, on April 23, 2018, the City Clerk received a petition, now formally designated as Petition G-18-233, calling for the Council to adopt a gun safety resolution at the May 1, 2018, Council meeting with an addendum including additional signatures presented on April 30, 2018 for a total of 184 signatures and 58 letters of support; and

WHEREAS, the Council adopted Resolution R-5312 on May 1,
2018, calling for further community engagement on the topics of gun
safety and community safety to provide feedback to the Council ahead
of the formation of the City's 2019 state legislative agenda and
supplement outreach efforts for the 2019-2020 biennial budget and
2019-2020 City Work Program; and

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114 WHEREAS, Resolution R-5312 authorized the City Manager to: 115 seek the community's input on the topics of gun safety and community safety through a Town Hall and additional engagement strategies; 116 117 research methods of promoting safe and responsible gun ownership at the state and local levels; collaborate with public and private partners 118 119 on possible state and local legislation around gun safety and community 120 safety; and report the results of these efforts to the Council, no later 121 than July 17, 2018, including options for potential changes to City 122 ordinances and policies, City budget initiatives, and the City's state legislative agenda based on the community engagement results; and 123 124

WHEREAS, at the Council's May 24, 2018 fiscal retreat, the Council received a financial forecast that projects deficits of \$8.4 million in the 2021/2022 biennium and \$17.9 million dollars in the 2023/2024 biennium, partially caused by the annexation sales tax credit expiration; and

131 WHEREAS, to sustainably fund these police investments, 132 community safety investments, school district investments and fire investments would therefore require new revenues or a significant
reprioritization of existing general fund programs such as parks
maintenance and street maintenance; and

WHEREAS, at the May 24, 2018 fiscal retreat, the Council
directed staff to engage the community through a survey and additional
outreach to help determine community priorities related to public safety
and community safety; and

WHEREAS, police and community safety are significant elements
of the ongoing, local outreach efforts and the nationwide conversation
related to community safety, including in response to repeated acts of
gun violence, including in our community and schools and frequently
involving mental illness, domestic violence and suicides; and

148 WHEREAS, on July 17, 2018, staff reported back to Council with 149 the results of the engagement program including a summary of the 150 community's desire for the City to take action now to implement programs designed to make our schools safer, increase mental health 151 152 awareness programs, provide funding for firearms training and safe 153 storage programs, and improve the effectiveness of existing gun related laws and policies, as well as the request by some members of the 154 community to effect changes to state and local legislation regulating 155 guns; and 156

WHEREAS, in addition to a ProAct Unit and new school resource officers, the City has identified that an effective action to reduce gun violence includes the addition of one (1) full-time mental health professional to help resolve police and emergency medical calls involving individuals with mental health complications, including domestic violence incidents, suicide attempts and assisting homeless individuals; and

WHEREAS, an additional effective action includes new dedicated
funding for the social and emotional health of children and teenagers,
and expanded funding for mental health, human services and afterschool programs that provide suicide prevention, domestic violence
prevention and drug addiction services; and

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WHEREAS, and additional effective action includes new annual
funding for firearms safety training in the community and safe storage
of firearms, including subsidized trigger locks and gun safes; and

WHEREAS, a safe community must ensure that all residents, but
especially women and children, have adequate shelter and are safe from
hunger, illness, crime and weather exposure and a key component of
reducing homelessness is funding operations for the eastside women
and family shelter; and

182 WHEREAS, the estimated annual cost of the police and
 183 community safety priorities referenced above is \$1.8 million in 2019
 184 dollars; and

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186 WHEREAS, RCW 82.14.450(2) authorizes the Council to submit an authorizing proposition to the Kirkland voters at an election and, if 187 188 the proposition is approved by a majority of persons voting, to impose an additional sales and use tax of up to one-tenth of one percent (0.1%) 189 of the selling price in the case of a sales tax or the value of the article 190 used in the case of a use tax, provided that one-third (1/3) of all money 191 received must be used solely for criminal justice purposes, fire 192 193 protection purposes, or both; and

WHEREAS, such an increase in the sales tax in Kirkland is the equivalent of one penny on every ten dollar purchase, and would increase revenues to the City in the amount of approximately \$1.8 million per year in 2019 dollars.

200 NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of the City201 of Kirkland as follows:

203 <u>Section 1</u>. **Purpose of Ballot Proposition**. The City 204 Council determines it to be in the public interest to fund, or in the case 205 of school resources officers to share equally in the funding together with 206 the Lake Washington School District, the following enhanced police and 207 community safety services beginning as soon as practicable. The City 208 plans that beginning in 2019, and within available resources, these 209 services would include:

- A Police ProAct Unit consisting of (4) full-time police officers and one (1) support position focused on illegal drugs, car prowls, burglaries, mail theft, shoplifting, enforcing extreme risk protection orders and court-ordered gun forfeitures.
- Four (4) full-time school resource officers ("SROs") in Finn Hill Middle School, Kamiakin Middle School, Kirkland Middle School and the International Community School, with the costs shared equally by the City and the Lake Washington School District ("LWSD").
- One (1) additional Neighborhood Resource Officer to focus on community policing, code enforcement and emergency calls involving mental health complications.

• One (1) full-time mental health professional to help resolve police and emergency medical calls involving individuals with mental health complications, including domestic violence, suicide attempts and assisting homeless individuals. This service might also be contracted rather than hiring a new City employee.

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Additional dedicated grant funding for the social and emotional health of children and teenagers and to expand existing mental health, human services and after-school programs that provide suicide prevention, domestic violence prevention and drug addiction services.

• New annual funding for firearms safety training in the community and safe storage of firearms, including subsidized trigger locks and gun safes.

- New annual funding to support women and family shelter operations, providing a safe place for women and families experiencing homelessness during their transition to stable housing.
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242 The amounts collected pursuant to the sales tax increase authorized shall be used solely for public safety purposes, which may include but 243 244 are not limited to personnel and related costs of recruiting, hiring, training, equipping and employing the public safety professionals 245 described above, and to pay other related public safety expenses 246 including costs of enhanced mental health, human services and firearms 247 safety programs described above, and for any additional purposes 248 249 authorized by RCW 82.14.450; provided, however, that at least onethird (1/3) of all money received under this section must be used for 250 criminal justice purposes. The Council reserves the right, in accordance 251 with its biennial budget process, to determine the levels of service to be 252 253 provided as permitted under applicable state law and within the available revenues collected from this increase. If revenues are 254 255 sufficient, the Council reserves the right to use such additional funds to 256 contract for, or pay personnel and related costs of recruiting, hiring, 257 training, equipping and employing additional personnel in other 258 capacities authorized by RCW 82.14.450 and to further expand mental health and human services programs. 259

261 Section 2 **Calling of Election.** It is hereby found that the 262 best interests of the inhabitants of Kirkland require the submission to 263 the qualified electors of Kirkland for approval or rejection at the election 264 to be held on November 6, 2018 of a proposition authorizing an additional sales and use tax of one-tenth of one percent (0.1%) on the 265 266 selling price in the case of a sales tax or the value of the article used in the case of a use tax pursuant RCW 82.14.450(2)(a). King County 267 Elections, as *ex officio* supervisor of elections in the City, is hereby 268 requested to assume jurisdiction of and to submit to the gualified 269 electors of Kirkland the proposition hereinafter set forth. 270

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273 Section 3. Submission of Ballot Title to the County.
274 The City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed, not less than 84 days
275 prior to such election date (i.e., no later than August 7, 2018), to certify

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the proposition to King County Elections in substantially the following form, prepared pursuant to RCW 29A.36.071:

If approved, this proposition would increase the sales and use tax rate by one-tenth of one percent (0.1%) to provide ongoing funding for public safety purposes permitted under RCW 82.14.450, planned to include additional police officers, school resource officers in Kirkland middle schools, after school programs and expanded mental health and human services programs focusing on gun safety, homelessness, domestic violence, suicide prevention, and related public safety issues. 309 310 311 312 313 314	Section 4. Authorization of Local Voters' Pamphlet . The City Council authorizes preparation and distribution of a local voters' pamphlet, including an explanatory statement and statements in favor of and in opposition to the ballot measure, if any. The preparation of explanatory statement, the appointment of pro/con committees and the preparation of statements in favor or and in opposition to the ballot title

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shall be in accordance with chapter 29A.32 RCW and the rules andguidelines of the King County Elections Office.

Section 5. 317 General Authorization; Ratification. 318 Certification of such proposition by the City Clerk to King County 319 Elections, in accordance with law, prior to the date of such election, and 320 any other acts consistent with the authority, and prior to the effective date, of this Resolution, are hereby ratified. Other proper City officials 321 322 are authorized to perform such duties as are necessary or required by 323 law to the end that the ballot proposition described in this Resolution 324 shall be submitted to the voters of the City at the November 6, 2018 325 election. Any action taken consistent with the authority and prior to the 326 effective date of this Resolution is hereby ratified, approved and 327 confirmed.
