RESOLUTION R-5462

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KIRKLAND SETTING PRIORITY GOALS FOR 2021-2022 AND ADOPTING THE 2021-2022 CITY WORK PROGRAM.

WHEREAS, in 2011 and 2012 the City Council approved annual
 City Work Programs, but determined that subsequent City Work
 Programs be adopted as biennial initiatives to better align with the
 biennial budget process; and

6 WHEREAS, the City Council has adopted Council goals for the 7 City that articulate key policy and service priorities and guide the 8 allocation of resources for Kirkland through the budget and capital 9 improvement programs; and

WHEREAS, due to economic cycles and fiscal constraints, equal
progress cannot always be made on all City goals and the City Council
must prioritize certain goals at certain times; and

15 WHEREAS, in 2021-2022 the City Council desires to help the community and the economy recover from COVID-19, help eliminate 16 17 systemic racism, ensure the safety and respect of Black residents, create more affordable housing, increase parks and open space, improve multi-18 19 modal transportation options, improve fire and emergency medical services throughout the city, retain a high quality of life in Kirkland, and 20 21 provide efficient, cost-effective City services to an informed and engaged public; and 22

WHEREAS, to help achieve these purposes in 2021-2022, the
Council is prioritizing all Council goals; Inclusive and Equitable
Community, Community Safety, Balanced Transportation, Dependable
Infrastructure, Thriving Economy, Sustainable Environment, Financial
Stability, Attainable Housing, Supportive Human Services, Vibrant
Neighborhoods, and Abundant Parks, Open Spaces and Recreational
Services; and

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WHEREAS, the City Council believes it is appropriate to adopt the 2021-2022 City Work Program to help implement these priority goals, identify the priority focus of the City of Kirkland's staff and resources, and enable the public to measure the City's success in accomplishing its major policy and administrative goals; and

WHEREAS, in 2021 the City Council determined to also identify the major policy plans, master plans and resolutions that are implemented by the City Work Program in the enacting resolution; and

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WHEREAS, the 2021-2022 City Work Program is a list of high 41 priority, major cross-departmental efforts, involving significant financial 42 resources designed to maintain community safety and quality of life in 43 Kirkland, as well as an effective and efficient City government; and 44 45 46 WHEREAS, since over the course of two years new issues may 47 arise that require substantial City resources and City Council review, the adopted 2021-2022 City Work Program will be evaluated during the mid-48 biennial budget process to proactively determine whether emerging 49 items can be accommodated, deferred, or if the City Work Program must 50 51 be revised or reprioritized; 52 NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of the City 53 of Kirkland as follows: 54 55 Section 1. The 2021-2022 City Work Program consisting of the 56 57 following initiatives is adopted: 58 1. Implement R-5434 elements such as non-commissioned 59 emergency responders, police transparency and accountability 60 measures, and community-wide equity and inclusion programs 61 to create a safer and more equitable Kirkland that increases 62 the safety and respect of Black people and reduces systemic 63 racism and poverty to implement R-5240 and R-5434 and to 64 65 further the goals of **Inclusive and Equitable Community**, Community Safety, Vibrant Neighborhoods, and 66 Supportive Human Services; 67 68 2. Complete construction and open Fire Station 24 in Juanita with 69 a cross-staffed crew of three firefighter/emergency medical 70 technicians (EMTs) to implement the Fire Strategic Plan and 71 further the goal of Community Safety; 72 73 74 3. Adopt a Fire and Emergency Medical Services ballot measure implementation plan, stockpile pandemic personal protective 75 76 equipment, initiate hiring of new and diverse firefighter/EMTs, complete design of the new Fire Station 27 in Totem Lake, 77 78 complete design of the renovation of Fire Station 22 in 79 Houghton, and locate and complete a temporary fire station to 80 implement the Fire Strategic Plan and further the goals of Community Safety and Vibrant Neighborhoods; 81 Initiate a supportive housing project in Kirkland, implement 82 significant affordable housing projects at the Kingsgate Park 83 and Ride and in the Totem Lake Urban Center, develop 84 85 affordable housing priorities for the NE 85th Street Station Area 86 Plan, and adopt and track affordable housing targets for low-87 income and moderate income residents as determined by the

88		Area Median Income (AMI) for the City to implement the
89		Housing Strategy Plan and further the goals of Attainable
90		Housing and Vibrant Neighborhoods;

The City organization shall demonstrate the 150 operational values of civic engagement, regional partnerships, 151 efficiency and accountability as the 2021-2022 City Work Plan is 152 implemented. 153 154 Section 3.
