RESOLUTION R-5507

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KIRKLAND ACKNOWLEDGING THE FIRST PEOPLE OF PRESENT-DAY KIRKLAND AND ADOPTING AN OFFICIAL LOCAL LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT FOR IMPLEMENTATION BY THE CITY IN VARIOUS PLANS, POLICIES, AND PROGRAMS.

WHEREAS, on February 21, 2017, the Council adopted Resolution R-5240 declaring Kirkland a Safe, Inclusive and Welcoming community for all people; and

WHEREAS, on August 4, 2020, the Council adopted Resolution R-5434, committing to examining and dismantling interpersonal, institutional and structural racism in Kirkland; and

WHEREAS, a land acknowledgement is a formal statement that pays tribute to, expresses gratitude and respect for, and helps raise awareness of the Indigenous inhabitants of the local land; and

WHEREAS, land acknowledgements have been adopted by other cities in Washington, including the cities of Edmonds, Everett, and Spokane, and across the nation, including the cities of Denver, Colorado; Eureka, California; and Eden Prairie, Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, the City has developed a hyper-local Kirkland Native History Document and formal local land acknowledgement in collaboration with the Duwamish, Muckleshoot, Snoqualmie, and Suquamish Tribes for review by the Kirkland community and approval by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, through the development of the hyper-local Kirkland Native Document and formal local land acknowledgement, the City is not taking a position on the status of federal recognition for any tribe.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Kirkland as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. The City Council adopts the following Local Land Acknowledgement (Acknowledgement) for official use by the City:

We acknowledge that the Southern Salish Sea region lies on the unceded and ancestral land of the Coast Salish peoples, the Duwamish, Muckleshoot, Puyallup, Skykomish, Snoqualmie, Snohomish, Suquamish and Tulalip tribes and other tribes of the Puget Sound Salish people, and that present-day City of Kirkland is in the traditional heartland of the Lake People and the River People. We honor with gratitude the land itself, the First People – who have

reserved treaty rights and continue to live here since time immemorial – and their ancestral heritage.

Section 2. The City Manager is hereby authorized to implement the City's Acknowledgement in various situations such as, but not limited to, at the start of City events and meetings, in facility signage, in place-name and interpretive signage, on the City's website, and in City plans and other documents. The Acknowledgement posted to the City's website shall be considered the City's initial official Acknowledgement. The City Manager shall draft a Local Land Acknowledgement Guide for approval by the Council and use by City staff.

<u>Section 3</u>. The City Manager shall encourage continued learning and dialogue about the Acknowledgement amongst staff and within the community and shall implement necessary updates to the Acknowledgement that may be identified. The City Manager shall incorporate community feedback to create a Local Land Acknowledgement usage guide for community groups, businesses, and other community members.
