## **ORDINANCE 0-4841**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KIRKLAND RELATING TO COMPOST PROCUREMENT, ADDING A NEW SECTION TO KIRKLAND MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 3.85, PURCHASING, AND ADDING A COMPOST PRODUCTS DEFINITION TO KIRKLAND MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 16.04, DEFINITIONS.

WHEREAS, Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill (ESSHB) 1799 related to organic materials management was enacted by the Legislature and signed by the Governor and became effective June 9, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature declared its intent through ESSHB 1799 to support the diversion of organic materials from landfills through a series of interventions to support productive uses of organic material wastes; and

WHEREAS, under the State of Washington's solid waste management laws, local governments are the primary governmental entities responsible for implementing solid waste management requirements; and

WHEREAS, ESSHB 1799 added new section RCW 43.19A.150, which requires each city with a population greater than 25,000 residents to adopt a compost procurement ordinance to help implement RCW 43.19A.120; and

WHEREAS, the City of Kirkland (City) contracts with King County (County) for the provision of certain waste disposal services, including organic materials; and

WHEREAS, the County reports that in 2019 organic materials comprised approximately 35% of all materials sent to the Cedar Hills regional landfill; and

WHEREAS, the County's 2019 Comprehensive Solid Waste Management Plan has a goal of achieving zero waste of resources by 2030, including through the use of composting and by maximizing the safe diversion of organic materials from disposal; and

WHEREAS, the City's Sustainability Master Plan has a goal, Goal SM-4, of achieving a local and countywide 70% recycling diversion rate by 2030, including through the increased diversion of organic materials from disposal; and

WHEREAS, in addition to reducing the amount of materials going to landfills, the diversion of organic materials, as well as market support for the safe use of compost products, will help meet other environmental and sustainability goals, including improved soil health and reduced greenhouse gas emissions.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Kirkland do ordain as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. A new section is added to chapter 3.85 of the Kirkland Municipal Code, Purchasing, to read in its entirety as follows:

## 3.85.260 Compost Products Procurement.

- (a) Prior to the issuance of a solicitation for bids or proposals, affected departments shall consider whether compost products can be utilized in connection with a city project. When such products can be utilized, their procurement shall be a required element of any solicitation issued pursuant to this chapter and in accordance with its terms.
- (b) Affected departments shall plan for the use of compost products in the following categories:
  - (1) Landscaping projects;
  - (2) Construction and postconstruction soil amendments;
  - (3) Applications to prevent erosion, filter stormwater runoff, promote vegetation growth, or improve the stability and longevity of roadways; and
  - (4) Low-impact development and green infrastructure to filter pollutants or keep water on-site, or both.
- (c) Notwithstanding subsections (a) and (b) of this section, the city is not required to use compost products if:
  - (1) Compost products are not available within a reasonable period of time;
  - (2) Compost products that are available do not comply with existing procurement standards;
  - (3) Compost products that are available do not comply with federal, state, or local health, quality, and safety standards; or
  - (4) Compost product purchase prices are not reasonable or competitive.
  - (d) The city shall give priority to purchasing compost products that:
    - (1) Produce compost products locally;
    - (2) Are certified by a nationally recognized organization, such as the United States Composting Council; and

- (3) Produce compost products that are derived from municipal solid waste compost programs and meet quality standards adopted by the Washington departments of transportation or ecology.
- (e) The city manager or designee shall develop and implement education and outreach strategies to inform community members about the value of compost products and how the city uses compost in its operations.
- (f) By December 31, 2024, and each December 31<sup>st</sup> of evennumbered years thereafter, the city manager or designee shall submit a report covering the previous year's compost products procurement activities to the Washington department of ecology containing the following information:
  - (1) The total tons of organic materials diverted;
  - (2) The volume and costs of compost products purchased; and
  - (3) The source or sources of the compost products.
- (g) Nothing in this section limit the ability to enter into collective purchasing agreements for compost products if doing so is more cost-effective or efficient.
- <u>Section 2</u>. A new section is added to the chapter 16.04 of the Kirkland Municipal, Definitions, to read in its entirety as follows:

## 16.04.250 Compost products.

"Compost products" means mulch, soil amendments, ground cover, or other landscaping material derived from the biological or mechanical conversion of biosolids or cellulose-containing waste materials or as otherwise may be defined in RCW 43.19A.010.

<u>Section 3</u>. If any provision of this ordinance or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance or the application of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not affected.

<u>Section 4</u>. This ordinance shall be in force and effect five days from and after its passage by the Kirkland City Council and publication pursuant to Section 1.08.017, Kirkland Municipal Code in the summary form attached to the original of this ordinance and by this reference approved by the City Council.

## PUBLICATION SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE NO. 4841

<u>SECTION 1</u>. Adds a new Kirkland Municipal Code Section 3.85.260 relating to compost products procurement.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. Adds a new Kirkland Municipal Code Section 16.04.250 relating to the definition of compost products.

SECTION 3. Provides a severability clause for the ordinance.

SECTION 4. Authorizes publication of the ordinance by summary, which summary is approved by the City Council pursuant to Section 1.08.017 Kirkland Municipal Code and establishes the effective date as five days after publication of summary.
