

RESOLUTION R-5615

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KIRKLAND RELATING TO SCHOOL IMPACT FEE FORMULAS AND METHODOLOGIES AND INCREASED STATE OF WASHINGTON SUPPORT FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION COSTS.

WHEREAS, the City of Kirkland ("City") strongly supports the ability of the Lake Washington School District ("LWSD") to provide high quality school facilities that meet the needs of current and future students; and

WHEREAS, one element of funding school facilities is to assess school impact fees on new construction to help fund new school capacity as allowed by state law, which requires that impact fees be proportional to the impacts of new growth and prohibits funding 100% of growth-related school construction projects; and

WHEREAS, the City Council is considering adoption of Ordinance O-4863 relating to school impact fee amounts for 2024 and amendments to Kirkland Municipal Code (KMC) Section 27.08.150 to reflect these amounts; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 27.08 of the KMC anticipates amendments by the Council from time to time to reflect revised school impact fee amounts determined by LWSD in accordance with the methodology and data contained within LWSD's Capital Facilities Plan; and

WHEREAS, the formulas and methodologies utilized by LWSD to implement the impact fee requirements of RCW 82.02.060 were originally established in 1993 and last amended by the King County Council in 1998, and have not substantially changed since the City adopted Ordinance O-4285 in 2011 authorizing collection of the impact fees; and

WHEREAS, since 2011, growth patterns and housing options have evolved in response to State, King County and City land-use policies and planning, with a focus on higher density developments such as missing middle housing and mixed-use multi-family developments in close proximately to transit service; and

WHEREAS, the City believes school impact fee formulas and methodologies should be reviewed and possibly revised if changes are needed to ensure adequate cost recovery, that the fees support and are reflective of the City's Comprehensive Plan and housing goals, and the fees are predictable for community members, home builders and elected officials and avoid significant fee changes each year; and

WHEREAS, the Council wishes to encourage such a review by LWSD, in partnership with the affected cities of Kirkland, Redmond and Sammamish, King County and other stakeholders; and

WHEREAS, the Council recognizes that school impact fees are only a small part of the funding necessary to build new school capacity and by law cannot be the sole source of funding and that school districts must look to other funding tools including state construction dollars and local bonds and levies approved by voters; and

WHEREAS, the Council acknowledges that state construction dollars have not kept up with construction demand and that current state law makes it challenging to pass bonds for school construction, even as state law requires school districts to provide the needed capacity; and

WHEREAS, the Council wishes to affirm support of LWSD-requested state legislative changes resulting in an increased "fair share" of state funding for public school construction costs and reduced barriers to passing local bonds.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Kirkland as follows:

Section 1. The City Manager is hereby authorized and directed to request that the Lake Washington School District, the cities of Redmond and Sammamish, King County and other affected stakeholders convene in a forum to evaluate the existing school impact fee formulas and methodologies and potential alternatives prior to Council consideration of school impact fee amounts applicable to 2025. Participating in the forum does not commit any jurisdiction to making any changes to the jurisdiction's current impact fee methodologies.

Section 2. The Council affirms the City's support for the Lake Washington School District's 2024 Legislative Priorities for school construction funding, including incentivizing funding for sustainable design and construction of school buildings, advancing a constitutional amendment that authorizes simple majority for school bond passage, and changing non-voted debt rules to be consistent with other capital funding rules.
