RESOLUTION R-5624

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KIRKLAND SUSPENDING FURTHER EXPLORATION OF Α COMMUNITY POOL BALLOT MEASURE IN 2024 AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO DEVELOP OPTIONS FOR YEAR-ROUND USE OF THE PETER KIRK POOL AND FOR ALTERNATIVE USES OF THE CITY-OWNED HOUGHTON PARK AND RIDE PROPERTY.

WHEREAS, on August 3, 2022, the City Council adopted 3 Resolution R-5551 authorizing the City Manager to convene a Parks 4 Funding Exploratory Committee ("PFEC") to meet from September 2022 5 through March 2023 and to recommend to the Council capital and 6 operating elements and funding mechanisms that could be included in one or more potential parks and recreation ballot measures; and 8

9 WHEREAS, PFEC included 45 community members who 10 studied Kirkland community needs and priorities based on the 2022 11 PROS Plan and reviewed potential ballot measure elements to meet 12 those needs; and 13

14 WHEREAS, PFEC highlighted that thousands of Kirkland 15 residents of all ages are on waitlists each year for swim lessons, aquatic 16 programs, and indoor recreation programs such as basketball, 17 volleyball, camps and classes because the City does not have enough 18 existing facility capacity to serve the growing community needs; and 19

20 WHEREAS, PFEC recommended that the Council place a 21 measure on the November 7, 2023 ballot that included an 86.000 square 22 foot indoor aquatic and recreation center, more year-round restrooms in 23 parks, green loop trail networks, new sports courts, expanded teen 24 programming and expanded beach lifeguard hours; and 25

26 WHEREAS, on July 18, 2023, based on thoughtful 27 recommendations from PFEC, and modifying the proposal based on 28 additional input from the Park Board and the Youth Council and 29 community survey feedback, Council passed Ordinance O-4857 placing 30 Kirkland Proposition No. 1, the Levy Lid Lift for Expanded Aquatics, Recreation, and Parks Facilities, Operations, and Programs, on the 31 32 November 7, 2023 ballot; and 33

34 WHEREAS, on Tuesday, November 7, 2023, voters in the city of 35 Kirkland rejected Proposition No. 1 with the subsequent feedback 36 predominantly focusing on the measure as being too expensive, too 37 complicated, and that voters opposed a permanent property tax to fund 38 the measure; and

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40 WHEREAS, following defeat of Proposition 1, community 41 stakeholders encouraged the Council to consider a smaller, less 42 expensive community pool proposal funded by a term-limited property
43 tax levy or bond; and

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45 WHEREAS, at the December 12, 2023 Council meeting, the 46 community member who led the opposition campaign to Proposition 1 47 also encouraged the Council to consider a smaller, more focused 48 community pool proposal funded by a voter-approved bond and 49 operated by a non-profit; and 50

51 WHEREAS, in response to this new stakeholder feedback, the 52 Council authorized funding for EMC Research to do a new community 53 survey and directed City staff to conduct additional outreach efforts to 54 better understand whether the greater Kirkland community would 55 support a community pool ballot measure in 2024; and 56

57 WHEREAS, EMC Research conducted a Council-approved 58 representative sample community survey from February 8 to February 59 15, 2024 and that survey was followed by an open-link version of the 50 same survey hosted on the City's website from February 15 to February 51 26, 2024, available to all community members; and 52

63 WHEREAS, staff gathered additional public input on the 64 community pool concept at the Kirkland Youth Council on February 12 65 the Senior Council on February 13, and also conducted three 66 community focus groups during the last week of February 2024; and 67

68 WHEREAS, the surveys and outreach summaries are posted on 69 Kirkland's website and the results were discussed at length by the 70 Council at the March 1, 2024 Council retreat; and

WHEREAS, the 2024 community feedback demonstrated that
the general public understands the need for a community pool and a
majority support the idea of building a public pool, but also that there is
not majority support to fund a community pool with a property tax
measure in 2024; and

WHEREAS, the King County 2020-2025 regional parks levy
includes direct allocations to cities as well as funds for aquatic facility
design and construction grants, with new applications being accepted in
the spring of 2025, and King County will be considering renewing the
regional parks levy in the fall of 2025.

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87 <u>Section 1</u>. The City Council hereby suspends further exploration
 88 of a community pool ballot measure for 2024 and directs that Parks and
 89 Community Services package all materials related to the community
 90 pool for consideration in future years.

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92 <u>Section 2</u>. The City Council authorizes the City Manager to 93 develop options for utilizing the Peter Kirk pool as a year-round facility 94 with a priority focus on swimming lessons for young children, and to 95 include those options as part of the 2025-2026 budget discussions. 96

97 <u>Section 3.</u> The City Council authorizes the City Manager to 98 pursue funding for Peter Kirk Pool and other aquatic facility options from 99 the 2020-2025 King County Park Levy as well as to engage King County 100 on development of the 2025 King County Park Levy renewal to 101 encourage that direct city allocations and pool funding remain in any 102 future levy.

104 Section 4. The City Council authorizes the City Manager to 105 explore alternative uses for the City-owned Houghton Park and Ride 106 property beyond a community pool or an aquatic and recreation center. 107 Alternative uses could include, but are not limited to, park facilities 108 identified in the PROS plan, such as community gardens, community 109 space, skate parks, and sports courts, as well as affordable housing 110 proposals, mixed-use development proposals, and public-private 111 partnerships. The City Manager shall regularly inform the Council on 112 the status of alternative use proposals for the property until such time 113 as the use of the property has been determined. 114
